- What place (within reach of your pocketbook and calendar) do you need to visit this year, and what will you do this coming month to make that happen?

It'll be a good year. Yep, there will be challenges along the way. But, we've got each other...and we've been reminded that God is with us in Emmanuel. We have so much for which to be thankful!!

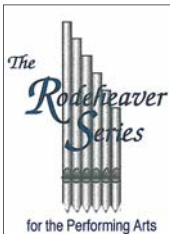
You've answered the call to serve on a church ministry team or committee... now what?

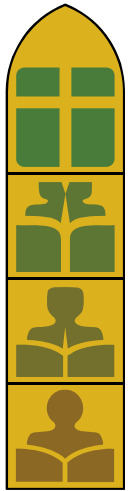
"Christianity and World Religions: Wrestling With Questions People Ask"

A Report from FUMC’s Outreach Ministry Team

Covenant Relationship Missionary: Meet our new Covenant Missionaries! **Gary & Vicki Stephenson** each serve as an Associate in Mission Service in the Red Bird Missionary Conference at Henderson Settlement in Frakes, KY. The Stephensons began serving this Appalachian community in 2001. Gary’s primary focus is the care and maintenance of a fleet of 27 vehicles which are utilized in various capacities in the ministries of Henderson Settlement. As Development Coordinator for Henderson Settlement, Vicki’s responsibilities include scheduling itineration for Henderson Settlement staff, overseeing the development and maintenance of all public relations material (website, Henderson Hollers newsletter, Appeal Letters, pamphlets), assisting with tours, research and grant writing, and coordination and planning of fund raising events, retreats and special events held on site. The Stephensons’ home church is Taylor Chapel UMC in Fort Wayne. More information about Henderson Settlement will be shared at the **Third Annual Soup Cook Off!** which will be held at The Connection on **Sunday, January 29, 2012.** (Look for more details and information on flyers posted around our campuses and in future worship folders.) NO-SEW FLEECE SCARF



Winter is a difficult time for people in need, so make this scarf to help someone stay warm.

What you need:

- Medium-weight polar fleece, 60" standard width (a 9" portion will make one scarf)
- Scissors
- An adult to help

What you do:

1. Cut a piece of medium-weight polar fleece to the size of 60" x 9". Cut the fabric across its width so the material is stretchy.
2. Trim off the edge binding. To add "fringe" along each end, make a 6"-long cut every half inch.
3. For curly fringe, pull each strand and then let go sharply. Another attractive option is to tie an over-hand knot at the top of each strip.
4. Donate your scarf to a local group that helps people in need. For greater impact, encourage your Sunday school classmates or other friends to make scarves, too.

THE ORGAN CHRONICLES

Our good friend and internationally known organist Jake Eschbach has been researching the history of the organs upon which he received his initial training, namely the pipe organs of First Church. Over the next several issues of The Chimes Jake will reveal his discoveries with us....

Alan Chambers asked that I write a little article on some archives that turned up last June pertaining to the organ at First Methodist Warsaw. I'm very happy to oblige, but first let me say how much First Methodist has meant to me all my life. If I was born Presbyterian, I understood early on that my mother's family had deep roots in the Methodist Church, and in Warsaw, it seemed that I was constantly crossing Market Street, going back and forth between "my" two churches even if we never held official membership. Jeannette Perry was one of my first teachers when I started studying organ at age 13, and it was Jeannette who gave me my very first public performance ever on organ at your church in July, 1964. I remember being very nervous because all of my teachers attended this church and I didn't want to disappoint anyone. It must have gone well because Jeannette invited me to play many times, and when she was ailing with serious arthritis in 1975 and requested a leave of absence to stay with her daughter Martha in Arizona, I played for her during a six week period. Ray Mills, Leroy Wise, Trudy Haymaker, Eula Rust and I remain lifelong friends. I will always have a very deep love for this congregation and will always be grateful for the support and opportunities it has given me over many years.

Years ago, the Organ Historical Society acquired all of the archives of the Moller Organ Company of Hagerstown, Maryland. It was Moller who built the original instrument in 1915 as the current building was just being finished. I had every intention of contacting OHS to see if they had papers pertaining to your Opus 2038, but it was just one of those things that kept getting put off. Finally, this spring, due to the fact that my university is now in negotiations with OHS to become the repository of their priceless archives and libraries, I remembered that I had intended to ask about your instrument. To my great surprise, they sent copies of a file containing almost 100 pages of correspondence back and forth between various church authorities of the time, including Rev. Neal, and executives at Moller.

Next month: plans for the new organ of 1915 are initiated.
