Friends,

Earlier this Spring, Scott and I vacationed for a week in Daytona Beach, Florida. A1A is the highway closest to the ocean, and along with the homes and hotels and high-rises, there are lots of souvenir shops, strip malls and restaurants. The number of boarded-up and For Sale signed restaurants was a surprise to me: many familiar designs of restaurant chains that we know were abandoned and surrounded by weeds.

I enjoy eating at new and different places, so we check out the “local fare” while we’re traveling. One evening we hadn’t gotten around to eat supper till almost 9. A nearby seafood place had caught my eye a few days earlier because of the daily specials they advertised, so that’s where we headed.

The hostess greeted us warmly, the server welcomed us and brought out some great homemade rolls. The dinner was excellent and we enjoyed the time and the setting and the attention of an excellent server. When she offered us dessert, assuring us that their key lime pie was homemade and the best around, I looked at my watch and asked if it was about closing time—it was nearly 10. She smiled and said, *“Actually, we’ve been closing at 9 because business hasn’t been so good. But we’re glad you’re here and if you’d like dessert, I’d be more than happy to serve you.”*

I felt so bad! We’d kept them open an extra hour—and yet, they hadn’t once hinted that we had intruded or were unwelcome. We gave her a nice tip, promised to come back another time for the pie and left.

Last week, after attending one of the wonderful evening worship services at Annual Conference, Scott and I and several of our friends headed out to a restaurant because none of us had eaten supper yet. It was about 9:30 when we left the auditorium, 9:40 by the time we filed into one of my favorite Mexican restaurants. The host greeted us with, “We close in 20 minutes.” We looked at each other, thinking out loud about what we’d do. No one really expects all the diners in a restaurant to file out at closing time. We wouldn’t be consuming any of the kinds of beverages that might extend our stay...hmmm. We looked at him for guidance. He said, “Our policy is that I *have* to seat you, but we do close at 10.” We looked at each other. He then said to us, “Applebee’s is open later. But I *have* to seat you if that’s what you want.”

“Well, thank you,” we said. “We *will* take our business elsewhere.” We did. We enjoyed half-priced appetizers for as long as we wanted, and the evening was good.

But I was amazed by the difference in hospitality.

As members of Christ’s Church, we want to be welcoming, open, ready to receive folks—whether they arrive early or late, whether they’re dressed one way or another, whether they’re familiar with our practices and routines or are confused with what to do with that little piece of bread they’re handed during that “snack time” that happens during worship every now and then.

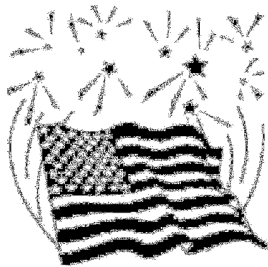

FROSTY FRESH GRAPE POPS

Jesus is our vine, and we are to be his fruitful branches. Have "bunches" of fun making this refreshing grape snack.

What you need:

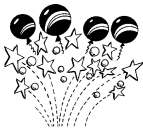
- An adult to help
- 4½ cups seedless grapes (red, green or black)
- Food processor
- Plastic spatula
- Strainer
- Mixing bowl
- Whisk
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- Food coloring (red, green or blue; optional)
- 5 oz. paper cups
- Aluminum foil
- Popsicle or craft sticks
- Another 2 cups grapes, halved (optional)



What you do:

1. Blend grapes in a food processor until smooth.
2. With a plastic spatula, press mixture through a strainer into a mixing bowl. Discard skins and skim foam off the top.
3. Whisk sugar into juice until dissolved. Add a few drops of food coloring, if desired.
4. Fill cups with juice, spooning most of the foam off the top. (If using additional grapes, put ¼-cup halved grapes into each cup.)
5. Cover each cup with foil and insert a wooden stick into the center of the foil.
6. Place cups in freezer.
7. To remove pops, take off foil and tear away cup. Enjoy!

Variation: To make layered juice pops, make two batches of mix from different-colored grapes. Fill cups half full with one color, cover and then insert the stick and freeze. Then fill with the remaining color and freeze again.

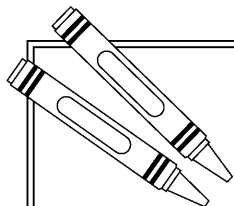
