Dear Friends,

Along the way, you and I hear stories of heartache experienced by friends, neighbors, and co-workers that come their way as a result of such things as an accident, illness, or the unexpected death of a loved one. We will often respond by thinking or saying, *"I don't know how folks survive times such as these without a church family."* We know that it's hard enough to deal with these kinds of challenges when our faith is strong and when we have people around us who love on us and who remind us of God's love. How sad to feel that you're all alone and not know the hope that can be found in our Risen Savior.

We tend to believe that we all have the same opportunities to grow in the faith and that some of us simply choose not to come to church. That certainly is true for some, but there are people around us who have never had any kind of an experience with a church and only limited personal relationships with Christians. They didn't grow up in a Christian family; the idea of coming to church is totally foreign and doesn't even cross their radar.

There are those who get up in the morning and realize once again that they have no one to share their day with. *I'm doing this one alone, too.* They drive to work and they're the only one in the car. *Does what I do matter?* They head back home again for a quiet evening. *Tomorrow I do it all over again.* And then a spouse walks out, a diagnosis is made, a loved one dies...*What do I do now? How do I face this? Where can I find hope?*

It's not that Christians don't face tragedy—the difference is that we don't do it alone. We have others who walk alongside us. We have Christ gently guiding us. And we know the hope that is found in the resurrection.

We are an Easter people: people who live each day with the knowledge of who Jesus is, knowing that he lived for our sake, that he died for our sins, and that he lives again. And being Easter people, it is our task and our joy to share that good news—because there are so many who need to hear it.

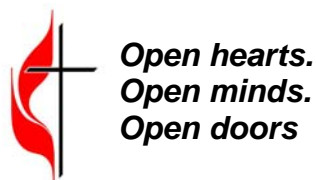
Look and listen for opportunities to share your faith. They don't have to be deep theological conversations, but simple words of care and concern: *"I don't know how you're dealing with this situation, but my faith in Jesus helps me during the tough times."* *"If it's okay, I'll pray for you. It always helps me to know that someone is lifting me up in prayer."*

Little things make a difference, you know? Little things can make a world of difference.

Financial Report to Congregation
Finance Committee
1st Quarter 2011
April 20, 2011

The last two years have been a financial struggle for our church. Responsible decisions were made at the time to control expenses within the level of contributions. We ended 2010 with contributions totaling \$536,845 and expenses totaling \$522,508. These positive results were accomplished primarily by two reasons---careful budget planning with personnel changes made in 2009 and members were faithful in their giving. We were all careful in our stewardship. I am pleased to report our overall operating receipts and disbursements for the first three months of the 2011 administrative year are very close to budget. The following are notes addressing only the variances from the budget approved at the beginning of the year.

1. Pledged receipts stand at +8.92% (+\$3,774) above budget because some members paid their pledges early in the year. Non-pledged giving is -12.4 % (-\$5,750) below budget. This giving fluctuates throughout the year thus at this time it is not of concern. Donations designated for specific missions go through the books but are not considered as part of the church's operating budget. Those receipts go directly to the specific mission; e.g., Community Closet, Stephen Ministry; or Trustee's special projects.
2. Total expenses are higher than budget by 8.96% or \$12,249. Some of these expenses are anticipated to level out over the year as the annual budget is divided out on a monthly basis. The major variances are as follows:
 - a. Trustee expenses were higher than budget due to heavier than anticipated repair and/or replacement expenses. (\$2,710)
 - b. Early in the year maintenance for snow removal at both facilities was higher (\$6,306).
 - c. Custodial supplies for sidewalk salt and new sweeper (\$760)

There are no major red flags at this time. A 2010 audit is to be completed in the next few weeks. If anyone has questions about the finances of our church, I will make myself available to answer them.

A couple of weeks ago in the Jail Museum, I was leafing through a scrapbook of men from Kosciusko County who had died or been wounded during World War II. A name caught my attention, Jack Thomas. I remembered that he had been my 'Uncle Tommy's' best friend and that Tommy had always spoken of him with a note of sadness in his voice because Jack had not come home. Who was he really? What did he look like? How did he die? Who were his parents? There is an old church bulletin in the Archives with a list of 10 men connected to our church who lost their lives in World War II; and, I suddenly wanted to know more about all of them. What followed was research that led to interesting and amazing stories.

Here briefly is just one of those stories: Robert Smith and Robert Burden both drowned in May 1941 (before the U.S. entered the War). They had contracted with the British Overseas Airways Corporation intending to ferry airplanes from inspection bases to airdromes. In late April 1941 they boarded a Canadian ship in St. Johns, Newfoundland on their way to England; but, their ship was torpedoed in the Atlantic by the Germans. A letter, written to his fiancée by a friend of Robert Smith, told how he had tried unsuccessfully to save Robert Burden his hometown buddy and flying companion who did not swim well. And later still, Robert Smith's parents were notified that his body had been found and identified by fishermen along the coast of Ireland and was buried there.

Those were just two of the men that I had the opportunity to learn about. Please take time to see and read about the rest of these men who will be featured every two weeks in the poster frames in the Fellowship Hall starting May 22 through July. They are: Bernard Faris; Robert Hunter; Norman Leedy; Edward Lucas; Cameron Robinson; Edward Stapleton; Jack Thomas; and Glen Wiltrout.

Making the Connection



Why do children seem to have a universal tendency to test the limits set for them by their parents?

Regardless of how strict or permissive the limits are, children often want to push, defy, negotiate, or in some other way test them. Although children may tell you it is because they don’t need or want limits, the opposite is actually true. Children test limits because they take comfort in knowing the limits exist. Yes, he probably really does want a later bedtime or curfew, or she really does want to know if you mean it when you threaten to confiscate her cell phone if her room is not clean. On another level, though, testing limits isn’t so much about bending the expectations as it is about making sure the limits are there. Limits let children know they are cared for, loved, and important enough to be worth supervising. If parents fail to establish limits, or continually back away from them because they don’t want to fight the battle, their children can feel anxious and abandoned, as if they are left to parent themselves. Some children resort to increasingly negative behaviors just to find out if anyone will ever intervene. You don’t have to win every battle, or be 100% firm on every issue. In fact, teaching children that you can be flexible when the situation calls for it is a good thing. They just need to know that someone older, presumably wiser, and with their best interests at heart is in charge, so they can relax and be children.
